Honorable Sir:

1. Respectfully, I believe it inappropriate for anyone, knowing the legal situation in New York, to join in the Bicentennial celebration, if he/she does nothing to rectify the situation.

2a. On June 6, 1944, I saw the great armada of ships as they were about to cross the English Channel.

b. I was unable to watch the armada on July 4, 1985, in New York Harbor, because there was an outstanding, totally unconstitutional and baseless order, directing the Sheriff of Westchester County, to "break into" my residence, "seize all word processing equipment and soft ware", and "inventory and report" my possessions.

c. My understanding, concerning the freedom to write, I thought was settled by the Peter Zenger trial, ironically in New York County, even before the adoption of the Constitution.

3a. On that day also, I was waiting to be incarcerated, after being convicted and sentenced, for the third time in one year, for non-summary criminal contempt, each time without benefit of any trial or hearing.

b. While my federal §2254 writ of habeas corpus was sustained, that was only after I had already served most of my short term sentence of incarceration.

4a. I enclose a copy of my impeachment petition, which as part thereof, sets forth the underlying facts.

b. Whatever aid Your Honor may give, to those who, like myself, believe in the Constitution, we would appreciate.

c. I intend to stand firm, even if it is to the tricentennial year!
