Thank you for your prompt and clarifying e-mail. Onondaga County has six state legislators, Senator Rachel May (SD48), Senator John Mannion (SD50), Assemblyman John Lemondes (AD126), Assemblyman Al Stirpe (AD127), Assemblywoman Pamela Hunter (AD128), and Assemblyman William Magnarelli (AD129). All are running for re-election, except for Mannion who is running for Congress – and all six are the subject of a <u>fully-documented July 18, 2024 grand jury/public corruption complaint to Onondaga</u> <u>County D.A. Fitzpatrick</u>, which additionally details (at pp. 4-6) D.A. Fitzpatrick's corruption, in office, and as lead co-chair of Governor Cuomo's 2013-2014 D.A-stacked Commission to Investigate Public Corruption. The complaint is above-linked and attached – and I will, additionally, forward you my July 18<sup>th</sup> e-mail transmitting it to D.A. Fitzpatrick and to New York's 61 other D.A.s., to which there has been NO response from any of them.

After you review it, I would appreciate your calling me so that I can furnish you with the electorallysignificant details about <u>Magnarelli</u>, in particular, the longest-serving, by far, of the six Onondaga County state legislators, the only lawyer among them, and fully familiar with ALL the complaint describes, including because he sits on the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, Assembly Committee on Oversight, Analysis and Investigation, and Assembly Rules Committee. He is also the only one of the six who is <u>uncontested</u> on the ballot.
