## TO: National Review Senior Writer Noah Rothman

I am director and co-founder of the national, nonpartisan, nonprofit citizens' organization, Center for Judicial Accountability, Inc. (CJA), based in New York.

Your excellent April 2, 2025 article "<u>The Case for Defunding NPR Just Got Stronger</u>" is in need of clarification – and doing so will win the case for defunding NPR and PBS, long advocated by <u>National</u> <u>Review</u>, as recently as <u>yesterday</u>, by making it an irrebuttable nonpartisan issue.

Your article states:

"NPR attempted to smear our own Rich Lowry by initially <u>accusing him of</u> <u>almost</u> (yes, *almost*) saying a racial slur — a slander that NPR's public editor felt compelled to call out as inaccurate".

This sentence implies that NPR's public editor is a functioning safeguard against its "inaccurate" journalism, with the second of your two links, to Editor in Chief Lowry's <u>October 4, 2024 column</u>, reinforcing it.

That the NPR public editor is NOT a functioning safeguard – nor the PBS public editor – is proven, irrebuttably, by my above-attached February 18<sup>th</sup> letter to House DOGE Subcommittee Chair Marjorie Taylor Greene and Federal Communications Commission Chair Brendan Carr entitled "Defunding NPR, PBS – & Firing the CPB's Inspector General, for starters", chronicling the fully-documented complaints of "*knowingly* false, corruption-abetting, election-rigging journalism" by local New York NPR and PBS stations that I filed with the NPR and PBS public editors – and proposing, as a methodology, that Chair Greene and Chair Carr examine how NPR and PBS "handle complaints of biased and *knowingly* false journalism" – a letter I sent them three times, by e-mail, on February 18<sup>th</sup>, February 28<sup>th</sup>, and March 21<sup>st</sup>, without response.

On March 24<sup>th</sup>, I tried to send the February 18<sup>th</sup> letter and three e-mails to the <u>National Review</u>, but was unable to do so because its website has no e-mail address for tips and its "<u>Submit a Tip" web-portal</u> has no feature for attachments. To overcome the problem, I constructed a webpage on CJA's website and then sent a web-portal message at about 11:19 pm, which I believe read:

"NEWS TIP: Behind-the-Scenes – March 26<sup>th</sup> House DOGE Subcommittee Hearing on NPR & PBS Bias See: <u>https://www.judgewatch.org/web-pages/press-suppression/public-</u> <u>media/alert-page.htm</u>. Please send me your e-mail address, so I can directly furnish you with the summary & evidence."

I received no response.

Fortunately, <u>your National Review webpage</u> includes your e-mail address. So, too, is an e-mail address included on the <u>National Review webpage of James Lynch</u>, whose March 26<sup>th</sup> article "<u>NPR Admits Error on</u> <u>Refusing to Cover Hunter Biden Laptop Story in 2020</u>" also referenced NPR's public editor, in stating, with a hyperlink to the <u>New York Post</u>, "Four years later, NPR's public editor <u>claimed</u> it did not cover the laptop story because of its 'tabloid nature'".

I am *cc*'ing Mr. Lynch with a request – which I am also making to you – to forward this e-mail to Editor in Chief Lowry so that he can authorize, on a priority basis, an investigative expose of the <u>February 18<sup>th</sup> letter</u> and my transmitting and subsequent e-mails, posted on and accessible from <u>CJA's EVIDENTIARY webpage</u> <u>for the letter</u>. This includes my e-mails to press and academia – the first of which was my <u>March 22<sup>nd</sup> e-mail to Hillsdale College Dow Journalism Program Director John Miller</u>, who is, additionally, <u>National Review's national correspondent</u>.

I look forward to answering your questions – and those of Editor in Chief Lowry. I invite your calls, no matter how early or late.
