Dear Chief Judge Lippman,

I was very warmed to receive the phone message by your staff member thanking me for the invitation, but regretfully saying you were not able to attend the Dominic Barter seminar at John Jay last weekend.

In case you are available, I wanted to let you know that Dominic Barter is continuing to present his work in North America in Montreal this Friday, Saturday and Sunday. See attached information on this event.

I thought that the highly engaging, intelligent and lucid presentation over the weekend was very well received by those in attendance and I highly recommend that you take this opportunity to see him in person. Successfully replicated and tested hypotheses of his theory conducted in Brazil are showcased in his presentation on the template he has created for establishing the conditions in which restoration and reparation will be more likely to occur on real and symbolic levels for the participants of the Restorative Circle.

It was exciting and encouraging for me as well as very informative and interactive. My deep desire is for diminished cultural and normative blindness to human cruelty within our systems and more life serving outcomes for all concerned. I think the window of history is open for exploring a new paradigm that would further these goals in a fresh new way.

This is why I offer you this information about another chance to attend the training yourself, if you are able, or to send a representative you fully trust, someone who would be able to fairly evaluate how and where this approach might take root in New York with something that might be as small as a pilot project in a single area.

One caveat for who you might want to represent you at the Montreal training if you decide that this is too valuable a chance to pass up and assuming you cannot make it yourself -- I would send someone who is not so invested in the way the justice system currently works under our explicit and implicit paradigm of blame and punishment as essential components of a system of justice.

Understanding Restorative Circles means being willing to suspend disbelief that eliminating punishment would or could work, steeped as we are, consciously and unconsciously with a view of human beings that insists on coercion as a necessary consequence for punishing those who are creating harm. This model requires a fundamental shift into imagining that shared power between three groups, the author whose act gave rise to the conflict, the recipient of the act, and a member or members of the community affected by the act, will lead to a greater likelihood that strategies will be created among the participants after everyone is heard and understood that will lead to reparation and restoration for the harm done in a way that can be sustained. The terms victim and offender are, by the way, never used in this work. Often, everyone thinks they are the victim so it is not that useful or descriptive as a term. Attendance in the circle is entirely voluntary. However, if one or more people cannot come, for example, the author or recipient or community member is deceased, or has refused to come, substitutes can be arranged.

Lastly, I add that Dominic Barter said that, unexpectedly for him, judges, police and gang members were more easily able to take in the principles of his Restorative Circle framework and process than psychologists, mediators, and teachers.

Dominic Barter has studied the interface between societal and personal change, and the role of conflict, since the 1980s. Since 2004 he has worked as consultant and training program director for the Brazilian Restorative Justice pilot projects, in collaboration with the UN Development Program, UNESCO, the Ministry of Justice, Ministry of Education and Special Secretariat for Human Rights. Dominic coordinates the Restorative Justice Project for the international Center for Nonviolent Communication.

Workshop Content

These two days will present the systemic approach developed by Dominic Barter as he worked with organizations, schools, court systems, intentional communities and prisons. Applied in the Brazilian Justice and Education systems, this process makes profound use of Nonviolent Communication to reconnect those separated by conflict and support them in reaching agreed action. Through dynamic exploration of the key concepts that underlie this model, participants experience the loosening of closed ideas, the uncovering of human motives behind painful choices and the discovery of effective strategies to meet pressing needs.

The practice will be grounded in a step-by-step process, and illustrated through examples - including video of live Restorative Circle sessions. Application in different social contexts – such as education, neighbourhood and church groups, families and business - will be explored. Finally, participants will begin exploring the application of this new resource in their communities.
