

Dear Members of the Commission,

I'm very sorry to hear that you did not receive my regrets on the earlier Manhattan hearing; I had replied that I was out of town on conference travel. I would be happy to help in any way I can, though personnel policies are not my area of expertise. What I do know is that the comparatively static public sector salaries we currently offer to senior officials substantially limits our ability to recruit and retain the most distinguished talent.

I would be happy to have a conversation on these topics with you or to recommend the names of people who have much deeper expertise than I do in state-to-state and government-to-industry comparisons.
