2	I've got five witnesses left after Ms.
3	Klein. No more additions, Lisa, no more
4	additions.
5	Ms. Klein, go ahead. Okay, Ms. Klein.
6	MS. KLEIN: Well, hi, good afternoon.
7	Thank you for allowing me to speak at
8	this very important hearing today.
9	I would like to preface my statement by
10	stating that I have been in matrimonial
11	Supreme Nassau County with justice Anthony
12	Falanga for six years now and counting and I
13	also would like to also mention take noticed
14	there are many others who are also in front
15	of Justice Falanga, same courtroom as I have
16	been in for the past six years.
17	We settled our divorce three years ago
18	and I still am trying to obtain the money
19	settlement in our settlement agreement.
20	Having said that, bear with me, this is
21	my first time I'm doing this and I'm really
22	nervous.
23	SENATOR SAMPSON: Take your time.
24	You've still only got nine minutes now.

1 MS. KLEIN: That's what I wanted to 2 say, too, I chopped my pages down, I only 3 have two and a quarter, so I won't take up 4 too much. I'll do my best. 5 I would also just like to say that as 6 soon as Judge Falanga heard my statement to 7 contest the divorce I was immediately 8 labeled in his mind as a trouble maker, even 9 though I was just exercising my legal right 10 to contest the divorce that I felt was 11 unwarranted and unnecessary. 12 But after that he made it his business 13 to make my life absolutely miserable each and every time I had to appear in front of 14 him in his courtroom. 15 I was made to stand and be humiliated 16 17 in front of the entire courtroom, degraded, he called me names, I was told I lived in 18 sin because I married someone out of my 19 faith so he told me I lived in sin for 10 20 years before we remarried in another 21 22 ceremony in the church, just to give you an 23 idea of some things that Judge Falanga is 24 capable of.

But in any case, if I could leave you here today with two very important words, and I'm glad to have -- to being followed by the person, the woman who spoke before me, two important words, children and mothers.

But I would be remiss to leave you here today without finishing the rest of those very important words, children, mothers, domestic abuse, domestic violence and our broken down excuse for a fair and just judicial system.

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12 It's broken and no one is fixing it and 13 that is a direct quote told to me within the 14 system itself when Judge Falanga changed my Order of Protection for myself and my 15 children and altered it from the Criminal 16 Court taking my children off of the Order of 17 Protection that was issued after he had 18 assaulted me and was arrested and spent the 19 night in jail, and Judge Falanga crossed out 20 my children's names and allowed my 21 ex-husband to reinstate his visitation 22 rights. 23

Also and most crucially important, the

drastic and horrifically damaging effects 1 and fall out, if you will, from the great 2 collapse, corruption and breakdown and 3 failure of our judicial system as it stands 4 today, is especially important. 5 But my most important and privileged 6 purpose and even mission for being here 7 today is to urge all of you to specifically 8 examine the numerous departments of what are 9 supposed to be our just and fair judicial 10 system in Nassau County, New York. 11 All of the following departments of our 12 government here in New York are drastically 13 broken down and need urgent examination and 14 swift cleanup, to say the least. 15 We must put back into place our fair 16 and just legal system as was intended by our 17 forefathers to be. 18 Some of the courts are Supreme Court 19 matrimonial, Criminal Court, supervising 20 judges, arbitration committees, the 21 Grievance Committees, the Appellate Courts, 22 judicial commissions, committees on judges 23 and judicial conduct, commissions handling 24

all complaints against judges, attorneys and 1 law guardians. 2 We know today that according to the 3 2009 report of the Commission on Judicial 4 Conduct, that out of almost 2,000 complaints 5 filed in 2008, only 262 were investigated 6 and of those, 173 were deemed dismissed. 7 Now if my math is correct that means 8 and leaves only 89. 9 89 out of almost 2000 complaints for 10 the entire year for 2008, only 89 people 11 were even examined and possibly taken 12 seriously, we don't even know that. 13 We do not know whether these 89 results 14 were favorable to the complainant or not, 15 and these figures do not even include all 16 the other complaints not entered by the 17 public for fear of retaliation by the 18 judges, attorneys and the courts. 19 I am even worried that I am sitting 20 here today naming names and saying what I'm 21 saying. 22 People are afraid to step up and 23 exercise what is their legal right to defend 24

themselves because they see others who have 1 done so and been sanctioned or punished in 2 some way or another by the judges and the 3 courts for doing so. 4 It is criminal what is going on in our 5 courts today and the innocent are being 6 unfairly judged and punished while the true 7 guilty parties walk away. 8 Imagine what that total figure would 9 have been if more people had the courage to 10 step forward but cannot and do not out of 11 fear for the retaliation by the judges and 12 who label these people instead as trouble 13 makers and punish them as such, as was done 14 to me by Judge Falanga. 15 We all know there is a major corruption 16 going on in our entire government, we all 17 see it on TV every day, we see it from 18 officers of the court, attorneys, judges, 19 supervising judges, even Governor's and 20 right up to the President of the United 21 States. 22 Perjury and adultery have become 23 commonplace. 24

These are both against the law, yet 1 last time I looked nobody is being 2 prosecuted for these terribly hurtful and 3 damaging crimes, especially to the children 4 of our world; the true victims in all of  $\cdot$ 5 these goings on. 6 Families are being broken up every day 7 and unnecessarily so and the children are 8 being hurt in so many ways. 9 The court should be sending families, 10 and this is really important, the courts 11 should be sending families to counseling 12 before handing out divorces like candy, and 13 for no good reasons. 14 What has happened to the family as we 15 know it in America today? 16 Divorce is now in epidemic proportions. 1.7 Almost everyone we meet are now either 18 divorced or know someone who is divorced. 19 Women, children, families are torn 20 apart, homes are lost, people are struggling 21 just to make ends meet. 22 In some cases children are brain washed 23 against a parent, thus creating a 24

horrifically painful and most depressing and 1 2 most cruel estrangement both on the part of the children putting them in the middle and 3 4 also on the other parent. 5 And custody is sought to get out of 6 paying child support, as well as taking the 7 home along with them. 8 The other parent moves out and life as 9 the family knew it will never be the same 10 again. 11 And the courts let it all go by. It is an outrage what is going on in matrimonial 12 13 Supreme Court in Nassau County New York, so 14 the innocent parties in this epidemic of 15 divorces --16 SENATOR SAMPSON: Thank you. 17 MS. KLEIN: How do I know? Because 18 it has personally happened to me and my two 19 children, and as I sit here today, I risk 20 myself being sanctioned by Judge Falanga 21 somehow, he will find a way, but what I am 22 saying here is only the truth and it must be 23 told. 24 I have been living this terrible

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experience in matrimonial court in Nassau 1 2 County for six years now and counting, I am still unable to collect the money which was 3 agreed upon several years ago. 4 SENATOR SAMPSON: When you say that, 5 6 Mrs. Klein, are you saying that the judge is stifling you from collecting your money? 7 What is preventing you from that? 8 MS. KLEIN: Well, my attorney has 9 informed me that she has released herself 10 from my case and she's decided that she's 11 done. 12 SENATOR SAMPSON: So basically you 13 have no attorney at this point in time? 14 Then when I try to MS. KLEIN: 15 contact they tell me to try to reach out to 16 Judge Falanga, which I did, and they sent it 17 back saying no, you still have an attorney 18 and I was getting to that part, I was going 19 to mention that. 20 21 SENATOR SAMPSON: Because your time is up, okay? 22 I'm almost done. Let me 23 MS. KLEIN: just get back to my spot, yes, it happened 24

1 personally to me and my children. 2 And as I sit here today, I am saying that I fear being sanctioned by Judge 3 4 Falanga, I really don't know what to do, I am in the middle. 5 6 I've been living this experience as I 7 sit for six years now and counting. 8 I am still unable to collect the money 9 which we agreed upon, I am told I may not --I may not reach out to the judge for 10 assistance, as I still have an attorney on 11 12 record, although this attorney has released 13 herself from the case, as I have just said. I am still in the middle and do not 14 know when it will end or what to do. 15 16 I am ill, I want to get my affairs in 17 order, and I cannot find anyone to help me get this money settlement, the QRDO 18 19 transferred over to me as was court ordered 20 and get my children back. I speak from fact, but of course from 21 many other emotions as one can well imagine 22 in a situation such as I am now living and 23 did not do one thing to deserve any of it. 24

1 I was and always would be a very caring 2 wife and mother, I loved being a stay at home mother and did it for 18 years and 3 treasured each moment. 4 The worst thing that can happen to a 5 mother is to lose her child. 6 7 I have two holes in my heart where my daughters used to be. 8 I have been alienated from my own 9 children, and the pain is so very difficult 10 to endure and the court did nothing it help. 11 The side with the money always wins. 12 What I need is an attorney who will 13 help me to obtain my money settlement as 14 ordered in the QRDO and have been waiting 15 now for years and also assistance with 16 getting my children back and unbrainwashed, 17 18 if you will. What has happened to our morals and 19 vows and promises we make in marriage and 20 families? 21 22 There should be mandatory counseling before any type of permanent and emotionally 23 damaging and scarring decisions and 24

judgments of divorce are handed out. 1 We have law guardians who may know the 2 legal rights of children, but they are in no 3 way trained in psychology or psychiatry or 4 even social work and yet they are allowed to 5 make very crucial and potentially damaging 6 decisions for these children, both mentally, 7 emotionally and financially. 8 SENATOR SAMPSON: Ms. Klein. 9 MS. KLEIN: I am almost done. The 10 lives of children are put in the hands of 11 law guardians who know nothing of what 12 children need and in most cases these law 13 quardians don't even have children of their 14 own on which to base their potentially emotionally damaging decisions upon. 16 I leave you here today, in closing, 17 with all of these words and hope that you 18 will help me and others who are lost and 19 abused in this terribly painful and damaging 20 and corruptive courts, in the matrimonial 21 court of the Supreme Court of Nassau County, 22 I even risk, as I said, being sanctioned or 23

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further punished, but it is a chance I must

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take to try to get back to justice in the 1 supposed halls of justice. 2 I have tried the grievance committees, 3 I have tried the arbitration committees, I 4 have tried writing to everybody all over the 5 place, and none of it helps. 6 It just does not make sense that the 7 guilty party here lie, cheated, committed 8 adultery and perjury and yet continues in 9 these behaviors and myself and my now two 10 estranged daughters are the ones being 11 punished. 12 It seems the old saying still holds 13 true, it's not what you know, it's who you 14 know, I hope someone will step up today for 15 me and my two daughters and help me get this 16 case straightened out as it should be. 17 I thank you for your time and in 18 advance of any future assistance, all of my 19 information is listed below on the papers 20 that I handed in. 21 I am Stephanie Klein, and I that you 22 for all for listening. 23 Thank you, Ms. SENATOR SAMPSON: 24

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2	Ms. Klein, what we will do I'll have
3	one of my staff people, Lisa Lashley make
4	sure, because I just want everybody to get
5	clear, you know, we are not looking to
6	basically have an input in the outcome of
7	these individual cases, because that's not
8	our job here, our job is to look at the
9	Commission on Judicial Conduct and also the
10	disciplinary committees to make sure that
11	any discrepancies or issues or any reforms
12	that need to be made or recommendations to
13	reform the present system as such, to give a
14	little bit more faith, trust and confidence
15	of the people who are using this judicial
16	system.
1.7	So that's what we are looking for,
18	that's exactly what we are looking for.
19	The outcome in individual cases, we
20	cannot have any input with respect to that.
21	But I will have somebody look at your
22	case closely, Ms. Klein, all right?
23	MS. KLEIN: Thank you, I really
24	appreciate that.

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1 SENATOR SAMPSON: Thank you. 2 MS. KLEIN: Just to say, I didn't 3 complain yet to the judicial commission to 4 Judge Falanga because he's not done with me yet, and I'm afraid of what he could do to 5 6 me before we are done. 7 SENATOR SAMPSON: But I think it's 8 good you come because sometimes judges, you 9 know, that's why you have the Commission of Judicial Conduct, you make these complaints 10 11 if you feel the judges is just stepping out 12 of his bounds of the parameters he is 13 supposed to be operating in. 14 MS. KLEIN: I feel almost a little safer because now I'm on record of saying 15 16 how I've been treated by him, and whatever 17 his future things are to do to me, will be 18 now noted because I have said, sat here and 19 given my statement of what has been done by this man to me until today. 20 21 So I thank you for your help after. 22 SENATOR SAMPSON: Thank you, Ms. 23 Klein. 24 The next witness is Ike Aruti of
