TO: FOIL/Records Access Officers for the Attorney General*, Judiciary, and Comptroller

According to the April 26, 2021 New York Law Journal article 'Why Didn't She Recuse Herself'? NY's Top Judge Sided With Her Own Greenberg Traurig Lawyer", the Attorney General declined to represent Chief Judge Janet DiFiore and Chief Administrative Judge Marks, in their official capacities, and the Judiciary's Administrative Board, sued in two lawsuits challenging the Judiciary's cost-saving decision not to recertify judges who had reached the age of 70 – and certified that they could be represented by private counsel. The law firm selected by the Judiciary for that representation was Greenberg Traurig – and a one-year contract was submitted to the Comptroller for approval.

Pursuant to Public Officers Law Article VI (FOIL) and §124 of the Rules of the Chief Administrator ("Public Access to Records"), this is to request all publicly-available records pertaining to: (1) the Attorney General's reason(s) for declining to represent Chief Judge DiFiore, Chief Administrative Judge Marks and the Administrative Board in the lawsuits — and for certifying that the Judiciary was, therefore, permitted to obtain private counsel; (2) the process, if any, by which the Judiciary selected Greenberg Traurig; (3) the contract retaining Greenberg Traurig; (4) the Comptroller's approval of the contract; (5) payments to Greenberg Traurig pursuant to the contract.
