Pataki panel seeks applicants for Kahn seat on state bench

ALBANY - Former state Supreme Court lustice Lawrence P. Kahn was officially in his new federal court chambers Monday as Gov. learge Pataki's judicial acreening committee regan searching for a candidate to fill the state curt vacaricy.

An advertisement appeared Sunday in the lines Union classified section notifying appliants to the state bench that the committee VES receiving resumes,

However, the new judge - more than likely-Republican because the appointment will be 'stalo's - can sit only until Dec. 31. The promise would have to run for a full 14-yearam in November in the seven counties amprising the Supreme Court's 3rd Judicial

The committee is accepting resumes until Wednesday, and they should be directed to Thomas Doherty, the governors appointments secretary, according to the ad. Applicants must be lawyers in good standing, be admitted to practice in the state and live in the 3rd Judicial District, which includes the counties of Alberry. Rensselaer, Columbia, Greene, Unter, Sullivan and Schaharie. The state post pays about \$110,000.

It is "normal practice" to advertise for judgeships or other elected officer where a vacancy exists, such as for county clerks, to solicit people's resumes to get the best candidate." Pataki spokesman Michael McKeon said.

He said he has no idea how many resumes are in, nor how soon after the deadline the

governor will act. The committee reviews the resumes and interviews candidates of interest, McKeon said.

Kahn, a Republican who had more than 20 years' experience in state courts, was sworn in. privately to the federal bench on Aug. 2, his law clark, Ray Santora, said Monday. Plans are underway for a ceremonial swearing-in that could occur in September, he said. The federal judgeship pays \$133,600.

Por several weeks, after Kahn's confirmation to the federal bench seemed imminent, numerous names emerged as illusy successors; both Democrats who want to run for the office and Republicans eyeing a Pataki appointment.

Frequently mentioned by insiders as the front-runner for the appointment is the state's solicitor general, Victoria Graffeo of Altamont.

Kahn's vacancy is one of three Supreme Court judgeships up in Nevember. Justice John Conner, a Democrat from Columbia County, is seeking re-election. Republican Justice George L. Cobb of Greene County is not.

Besides Graffeo, Republicans mentioned as possible candidates include Rensselaer County District Attorney Mary O. Donohue, Ulater County Pamily Court Judge Marianne O. Mizel, and Republican lawyer William Sorpnen, longtime clerk to Supreme Court Justice Harold J. Hughes of Albany, and Albany Law School professor Michael J. Hutter.

Democrate said to be interested include Albany County judges Larry J. Rosen and Thomas A. Breelin, Family Court judges Gorard Maney and Dennis Duggan, and City Court Judge Stephen W. Herrick.
